## **15 TECHNIQUES TO TRY**

# **Street Photography**



White balance is key for ensuring you get the best colour reproduction in any given light situationist. The following pre-sets are a guide as to when and where to use them for better colours

#### Gear needed

**Small camera:** Street photography relies on you being portable, agile and discreet. The Leica is the gold standard

**Prime lenses:** If you do use detachable lenses, primes, which tend to be smaller are your best bet. Use your feet as a zoom

**Hand strap:** Helps you pivot, move and twist about quicker and easier. It's more secure and less obvious than a neck strap

**Small kit bag:** Most photographers need backpacks or large kit bags. For the street, keep it small, light and less conspicu-

#### Techniques to learn

**Shooting from the hip:** bringing your camera all the way up to your eye takes time. Learn to shoot fast from any height

A fast eye: The streets are always moving and can be chaotic at times, you must adapt your eye to rapidly changing situations

Patter: You can't be shy or quiet when out & about, learn to ask for photos, opportunities and whatever it takes to get the shot

**Framing:** Buildings, signs & doorways are everywhere, framing is a bedrock of the street so learn to spot natural frames

**Photojournalism:** The art of street photography can easily turn in to photojournalism. The two skills are interchangeable

**Fishing & hunting:** Two diametrically opposing skills. Try both then learn to refine the one you feel best about.

Laws, rights & ethics: You need to know what the law is, what your rights are/aren't and where you want to draw your own lines. Find what makes you comfortable

**Geometry:** Buildings and streets are full of geometric shapes, don't just look at people, look up and around

**Embrace failure:** Street photography is 99% failure. You must go out continually, get little to nothing and not get knocked back

**Stick with it:** No one takes great street photos without a few thousand hours under their belt. Giving up is the enemy.

#### **Process**

**Research the area:** study maps, look a hot spots, unique areas, the history and demographic of an area. Ask the locals as well

**Check weather:** Weather apps and golden hour apps are ideal for planning when to go out.

**Plan your route:** Know where you're going. Don't drift around an area unknowingly.

**Shoot until you are tired:** Keep going as long as you can, the more you shoot the more you'll get. Don't be limited by time.

**Store your shots:** You should be taking a lot of shots. So learn effective storage, processing and retrieval.

**Process in bulk:** Get good at chunking through lots of shots, rating and processing them. Learn the short cuts too.

**Show your work:** Whether it's on socials, a website folio or in print, learn how to show your results.

## **Street Photographers**

**Joel Meyerowitz** is often regarded as the greatest living street photographer alive today. His work is a benchmark for modern colour street photography.

**Helen Levitt** was particularly noted for her surreal street photography of New York City. She was described as "the most celebrated and least known photographer of her time"

**Vivian Maier** was almost entirely unknown, earning her way as a nanny and shooting over 150,000 photos that remained undeveloped until after her death. She is now a highly regarded, well exhibited and world renowned photographer.

**Saul Leiter** early work in the 1940s and 1950s was an important contribution to what came to be recognized as the New York school of photography.

**Fan Ho** documented the Hong Kong street scene in the 1950s and 1960s. His photos are masterpieces of light and shadows and are both surprisingly sharp, crisp and timeless
